From the Chief Executive

The Board's Annual Report sets out how the Board has been able to provide a significant flow of funds to its Public Health Entity (PHE) stakeholders in accordance with the purposes for which funds are held and in line with priorities decided by the PHEs.

Investment performance fuelled by stronger investment markets globally resulted in a much stronger investment return in 2022-23, reversing the poorer returns in 2021-22, which were driven by global macroeconomic and geopolitical influences such as high inflation, trade and political tensions including the continuing Ukraine war, and supply-chain issues that first became apparent during the Covid 19 global pandemic. The one constant appears to be continued volatility in investment markets, a characteristic expected to continue at least for the short to medium term.

As part of managing this variability and volatility the Board invests with the assistance and guidance of its ongoing advisors Funds SA and seeks a long-term target of CPI + 2.5% following clearly defined investment policies and strategies. As a result of the policies and strategies implemented and pursued, the Board remains in a strong position to continue providing ongoing funds at similar levels in 2023-24 and beyond.

Bequests and donations to public health entities were strong during the two previous years, coinciding with the effects of the Covid 19 pandemic. Levels reverted back to lower levels in 2022-23.

Payments to PHEs increased during 2022-23 but still remain significantly lower than the budgets requested by PHEs, approved by the Board, and subsequently implemented and claimed by the respective PHE. Against approved PHE budgets totalling \$16.4m, \$7.0m was claimed by PHEs. This is similar to the experience of the Board in previous years (with the respective numbers in 2021-22 being \$16.0m and \$6.2m).

The Board continues to provide governance and integrity to the holding and investing of charitable gifts and donations to ensure that ongoing significant funding streams are available for PHEs and that funds are applied in accordance with their charitable nature, legislation and wishes of donors.

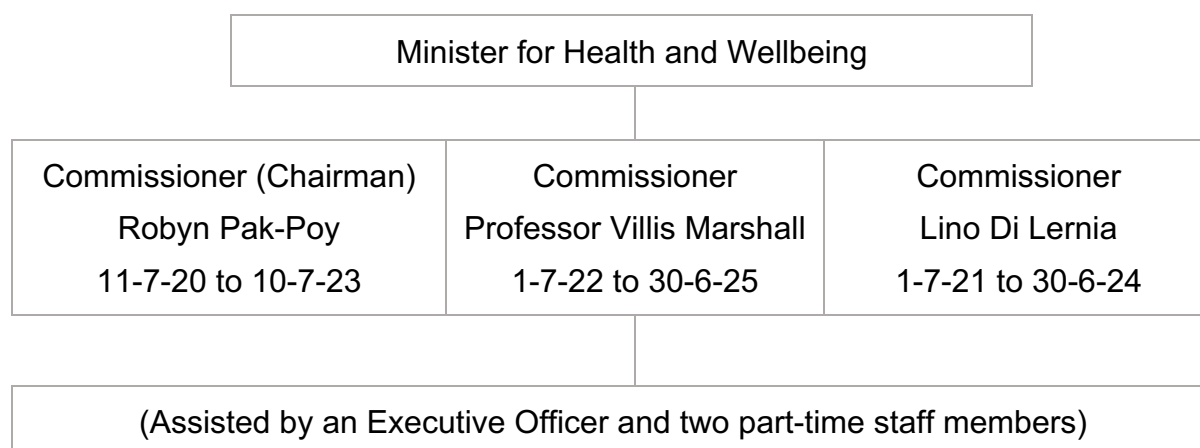

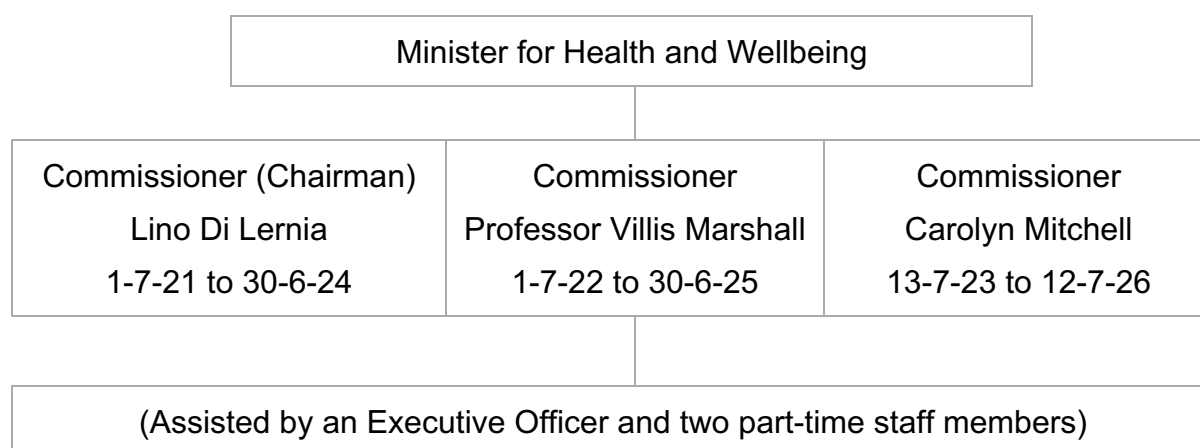
Our strategic focus

Funds held are invested to earn a return for the hospitals and institutions concerned. Funds are then applied for research, services, and equipment in accordance with the purpose for which they were originally donated or gifted.
Our Vision	To provide excellence in the Board's stewardship, investment and application of funds held by the Board to benefit PHEs and relevant research bodies in their delivery of services, equipment, and research in accordance with the <i>Health Services Charitable Gifts Act, 2011 (HSCG Act)</i> .
Our Values	The Board operates ethically to fund research and other expenditure by the various PHEs for which it holds funds. The Board acts commensurate with the perpetual nature of the Board.
Our functions, objectives, and deliverables	1. The agency's performance

Performance at a glance

Total Assets held at 30 June 2023 were \$172.7m, an increase from \$162.7m at 30 June 2022.

This increase was attributable to significantly stronger investment performance than the preceding year with key factors being high inflation, global political influences, and stresses with tightening fiscal measures by central banks being at least partly ameliorated, resulting in stronger investment asset prices and expectations.

The stronger investment performance offset the lower level of gifts received.

Factors influencing the increase in assets included:

- Stronger investment performance in 2022-23, particularly investments invested in Funds SA and the revaluation of the Board's key property asset.
- The failure of PHEs to implement and claim a significant portion of Board approved budgets.

Funds SA continues to provide the Board with high calibre investment advice, which assists it to generate sufficient income to enable the Board to maintain a significant sustainable flow of funds to PHEs for the foreseeable future.

Funds SA, the Board's funds investment manager, has indicated the better investment performance in 2022-23 was the result of the following factors.

- Inflation rates while lower than the recent peak levels continue to be higher than the various central bank targets.
- In their efforts to combat high inflation rates central banks aggressively increased cash rates by 3-4%.
- Economic growth while positive, was modest.
- Listed equities performed strongly as investors anticipated the end of the interest rate tightening cycle.
- Other assets produced mixed returns.

Funds SA also advise that investment options with lower allocations to growth assets and a shorter-term investment focus underperformed their investment objectives. This was due to the afore-mentioned high inflation rate and measures taken by central banks to combat such rates, and the stronger allocations of these products to fixed interest asset classes and correspondingly lower allocations to growth assets that produced higher returns.

The Board works closely with Funds SA and continues to invest for the longer term. This approach has proven successful as investment returns have compared favourably with the long-term targets set. Funds SA also report that most investment options have exceeded their return objectives over a 10-year period.

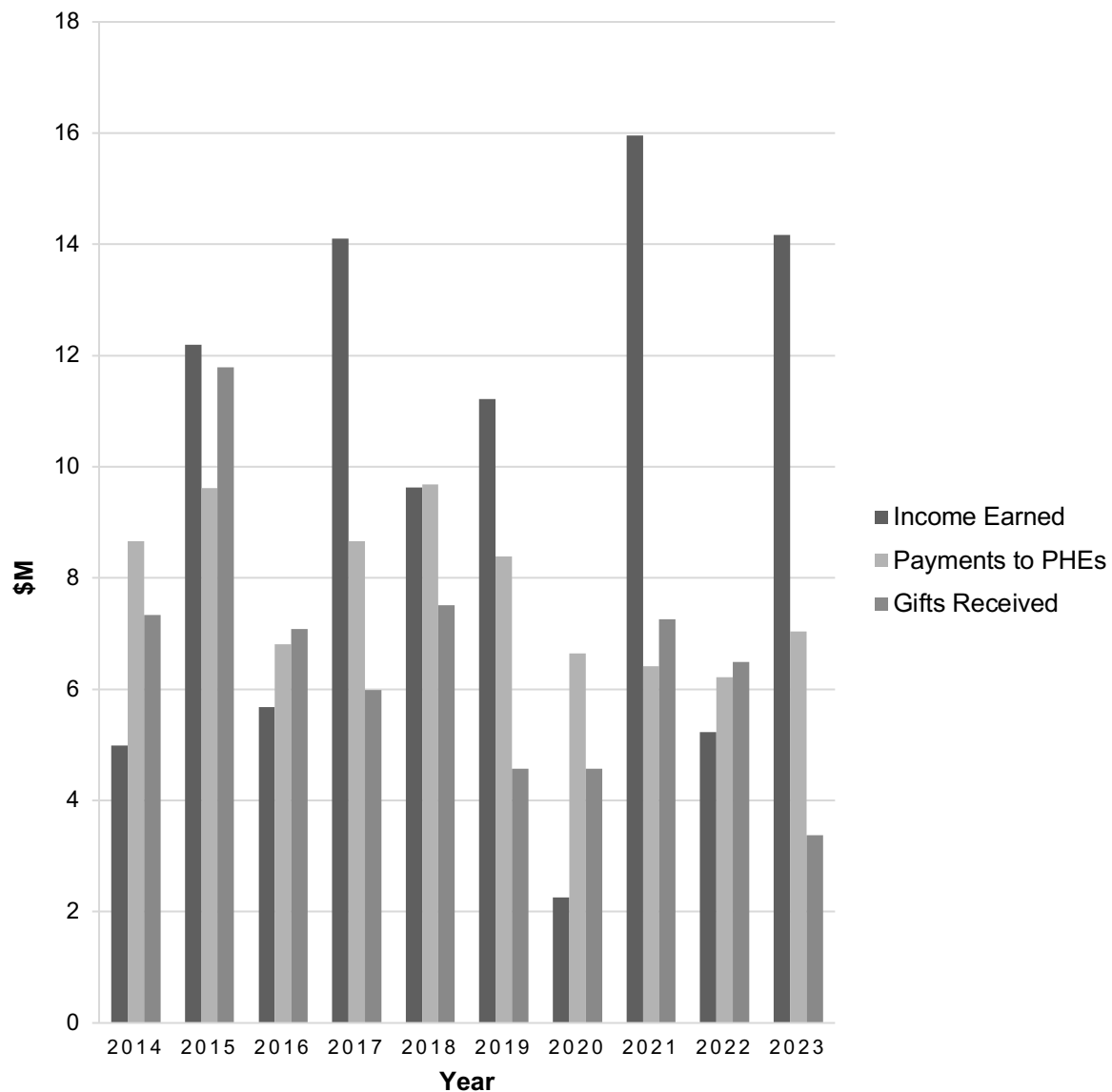
The major determinants of the Board's performance over the last 10 years are shown on the next page. These are: HSCGB income earned; gifts received; and payments to PHEs by HSCGB.

Gifts from bequests tend to fluctuate from year to year and there has been a trend over time for other donations to decline. During 2022-23 the aggregate level of bequests declined from that experienced in 2020-21 and 2021-22, which coincided with the pandemic years. The aggregate of bequests and donations of \$3.4m is closer to expectations than the previous two years where total bequests and donations exceeded expectations.

The amount available to be spent from accounts such as Doctors' Right of Private Practice continues to decline, as funds held in these accounts are continuing to fall following changes to the rules applying to Private Practice income that occurred in recent years.

For the 2022-23 year the Board approved expenditure totalling \$16.4m (this approved expenditure included \$5.1m for a Da Vinci machine which was not spent). Of this amount, PHEs claimed \$7.0m as having been spent. This underspend by PHEs continues a longer-term trend (\$6.2m in funds was provided during 2021-22 against an approved budget of \$16.0m, (including \$5.1m for a Da Vinci machine which was not spent).

Corporate performance summary

Total Assets held at 30 June 2023 were \$172.7m, (\$162.7m at 30 June 2022). This variation was driven by the following key factors.

- Underclaiming of budgets approved by HSCGB with funds expended by PHEs at \$7.0m, less than the budget sought by PHEs and approved by HSCGB of \$16.4m (which included \$5.1m for a Da Vinci machine which was approved but not claimed).
- A reduced inflow of gifts and donations \$3.4m (\$6.5m in 2022) was offset by higher than anticipated investment returns.

Other financial information

Investments

The Board continues to hold most of its investments in investment products with Funds SA. These investments are made in accordance with the Board's investment policies which are reviewed annually.

Investing with Funds SA (a large institutional investment specialist servicing the South Australian Government and its statutory authorities) continues to provide the Board with advantages, including the following.

- Access to leading institutional investment consultants, fund managers and investment strategies generally not accessible to smaller investors.
- The economies of scale arising from Funds SA's over \$41 billion (as at 30 June 2023) funds under management.
- A broad suite of investment implementation alternatives, enabling customisation of the Board's investment strategies to achieve the specific requirements of the various Trusts and bequests administered by the Board.
- Comprehensive institutional quality investment administration and reporting services.
- Specialist investment governance supported by an extensive risk management framework.

The Board's property investments are discussed later in this report.

The Board meets regularly with Funds SA personnel. In addition, Board staff are in frequent contact with Funds SA personnel.

Investment Advisor

Under Section 23 of the HSCG Act, a public sector employee appointed by the Minister for Health and Wellbeing is to hold a position as Investment Advisor to the Board.

The Board met with Mr Munro from SAFA, the appointed Investment Advisor quarterly throughout the financial year. The meetings with Mr Munro were of a general nature in relation to the investment environment, performance of the Board's investment manager, Funds SA, investment policies and approach, and investment risk management as they pertained to the Board's investments. As a matter of course, the investment policies are referred to Mr Munro for comment. Mr Munro continues to be supportive of the Board's approach towards risk and its investment strategies.

No specific advice was given, or formal recommendations made to the Board by Mr Munro during the financial year.

Investment Strategies

The Board's investing responsibilities extend across several trusts and bequests, each with specific requirements and constraints and, accordingly, require tailored investment strategies.

The Board has developed and maintained an investment strategy for each portfolio it administers in consultation with Funds SA.

HSCGB Pool portfolio

This portfolio comprises over 400 individual funds, trusts, or bequests with sufficient commonality of purpose to allow their aggregation for investment purposes.

This portfolio includes the Martin Portfolio, which was previously reported separately due to its size with its value at 30 June 2023 being \$72.0m. Operationally, the Martin portfolio has always been run as part of the HSCGB Pool. As reported in 2021, the Board made the decision to align the reporting of funds in line with how the investments are managed since 1 July 2020.

- Loan at a concessional interest rate to SAHMRI to purchase and establish a Cyclotron facility;
- First mortgage charge over advances made to the Port Pirie Hospital Inc. This loan is long-standing and interest free; and
- Small commercial property in Waymouth Street Adelaide.

The Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust (Norman Trust)

This portfolio comprises a bequest from the late Raymond Simpson Norman to establish the Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust (**Norman Trust**), further particulars of which are set out later in this report.

In recognition of the long-term nature and certainty of funding commitments of this Trust, the Board has maintained a more aggressive investment strategy than the HSCGB Pool. This has served the Trust well with its value growing from the original value of \$4.4m at the time of Mr Norman's death in late 2009 to this year's value of \$7.6m due to consistent strong growth in earlier years. The Board was appointed as Trustee to this testamentary trust by the Supreme Court in November 2011. Significant funding has been advanced for cancer research by the Trust over this period since the Board's appointment as trustee and the Trust's assets have also grown over this time.

Following the investment strategy review completed near the previous year-end by Funds SA, and the implementation of consequential changes to the investment policy for this trust the Board as trustee no longer invests Trust funds in Funds SA Moderate, Funds SA High Growth, and Funds SA Cash, with all funds invested in the Funds SA Balanced option. The effect of this change was to achieve implementation efficiencies, a small increase in expected returns over the forecast horizon, with a small increase in risk, while remaining within the investment parameters established by the Board.

D E Brown Charitable Trust (Brown Trust)

This Trust was established by deed poll on 17 December 2014. The late Mrs Brown left the residue of her estate for the "*benefit of sufferers from kidney diseases or complaints*". Following a Supreme Court decision, the deed poll was executed, providing for the HSCGB to act as trustee.

PF Beinke Charitable Trusts

The three PF Beinke Charitable Trusts were established under a Deed of Trustee Retirement, Appointment, and Indemnity (**Deed**) in July 2020. The late Mr Beinke left the residue of his estate in equal parts to the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Flinders Medical Centre, and Daw Park Repatriation Hospital.

HSCGB is the trustee of the three trusts, which are detailed as follows.

Discussions with the Board's investment advisor were extensive throughout the year and are summarised above on page 8 of this report. Returns this year have been better than the previous year but investment market conditions remain volatile, reflecting a combination of events such as the pandemic, the macroeconomic response to geopolitical issues including war and global tensions.

The Board remains confident that the risk-adjusted investment returns generated from the assets managed by Funds SA will meet the Board's investment objectives, thereby assisting to maximize within prudent parameters, the future distributions from each portfolio.

Property Assets

The Board owned one building in the 2022-23 year, a suite of four offices located at 234-240 Waymouth Street Adelaide. The Board occupies 240 Waymouth Street, with the remainder of the property (numbers 234-238) leased to commercial tenants. As at 30 June 2023, the Board reviewed the value of its direct property investment to ensure that all property is valued at fair value in accordance with Board policies. The Board plans to hold this property at least for the medium term.

In addition, the Board in accordance with section 25 of the HSCG Act holds in perpetuity:

- Ground on which the Rundle Square building is located - Town Acre 86 and part Town Acre 85.

The Board (and its predecessors) have held this land since the early 1900s.

Pursuant to the head lease, which expires in 2052, the Town Acre 86 investment is re-valued every 5 years. Rent is adjusted whenever the 5-yearly professional revaluation is completed. The 2021 5-yearly revaluation process was completed in March 2022 and resulted in an increase in the land value of \$9.1m from \$27.2m to \$36.3m in the previous financial year.

Investment Loan to SAHMRI to Finance the Establishment of Cyclotron Facility at SAHMRI

In the 2012-13 year, following extensive consultation with the RAH and other interested stakeholders, the Board entered a strategic investment to fund the establishment of a cyclotron facility, by providing a 15-year secured loan to SAHMRI.

The loan is at a concessional interest rate in recognition of the benefits accruing from this facility and is secured against investments held in a separate subsidiary of SAHMRI.

A cyclotron makes relatively short-lived radioisotopes, which are used for medical imaging and research. These radioisotopes can be used in PET scans which are used in the diagnosis and staging of cancer. Most of the isotopes produced for these studies have a short half-life and rapidly degrade. Isotopes are also supplied to various interstate customers. Having a cyclotron in Adelaide, makes it possible to utilise isotopes for a range of research and medical treatment applications, which would not have been possible before the cyclotron was established. As a result, the benefits accruing to PHEs such as the RAH are significant.

In accordance with the loan documentation, principal repayments to HSCGB under the finance facility commenced during 2018-19 and have continued since.

Other information

Other information requested by the Minister or other significant issues affecting the Board or reporting pertaining to independent functions are set out in the pages following.

Funds Applied

The Board approved requests from PHEs for \$16.4m of funding in the 2022-23 financial year and against that, a total of \$7.0m was applied on account of expenditure claimed during the 2022-23 year by PHEs (this approved expenditure included \$5.1m for a Da Vinci machine which was not spent). Details of funding applications are shown in the following table.

There were no committees established during the 2022-23 financial year under Section 24 of the HSCG Act.

Board Policies

The Board has reviewed and updated the policies that cover the way funds are managed, invested, and applied. New and additional policies have been established where considered appropriate.

Funds vested in the Board are used for the purpose for which they were donated. This is almost always at the institution for which the assets are held. In instances where the funds cannot be used for the purpose donated at that institution, consultation as provided for under Section 18(3) of the HSCG Act is undertaken to determine whether funds can be redirected to enable them to be used for the purpose intended. No such transfers occurred in the financial year.

Projects funded

The Board funds many and varied projects. Some of the notable projects funded include:

- Cultural Immersion Project aimed at addressing cultural concerns from patients who may feel disconnected from their home, country and culture when undergoing various medical treatments which keep them away from home, family, and friends for extended periods of time. The aim is to support healing, cultural connection and improve general wellbeing.
- Telemedicine Implementation project run through Women's and Children's Hospital is now in its third year of funding and continues to improve access to healthcare services for patients who live in regional, rural, and remote areas. The telehealth services offered encompass diagnosis, preventative and curative treatment as well as being able to support the management of patients at home. With video consultations and expansion of the overall project the service is proving an invaluable asset. In addition, the service has won several Premier and Industry Association Awards.
- One of the CEO Rapid Improvement Project Scheme (CRIPS) project funded at the RAH through 2022-23 was Improving Care pathways through Tertiary and Primary Service Integration. This project set out to understand and define healthcare experiences for patients commencing chronic dialysis (particularly the interface between primary and tertiary healthcare systems) and to develop, implement and evaluate strategies to improve primary care and support for those patients based on the identified experiences. Research learnings were that primary care patient engagement is crucial for holistic support along with improved communication with patients. Where communication was lacking, and patients felt they were the information conduit between primary and tertiary care this caused undue stress and reduced confidence in healthcare services and their ultimate care outcome. Early and ongoing individualised education

and psychosocial support increased patient wellbeing as well as management of patients in an outpatient setting rather than as inpatients.

- From late 2018 through until early 2021, the Board as Trustee of the Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust funded a project run by Professor Simon Conn “*Circular RNAs as trojan horses of oncogenesis*”. Recently the continuing success of this project has led to Professor Conn publishing further discovery in a world-leading journal. In Professor Conn’s words:
 - *“I was humbled to have received funding from the Ray & Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust. This supported our research into the formation of mutations which drive a devastating form of blood cancer, called acute myeloid leukemia. While we have long understood that external factors such as diet, ultraviolet light, smoking or genetic factors that are inherited from your parents, this research identified internal genetic fragments are able to drive the cancer-causing mutations. This discovery, published in the world-leading journal Cancer Cell, is rewriting the textbooks regarding the understanding of how cancers can arise. As a result, this work was the subject of over 100 news articles across the world and has resulted in me being invited to give plenary seminars at conferences in China, Greece, New Zealand and USA. I would like to thank the HSCGB for trusting me with these funds and sincerely believe these have been gainfully employed to achieve publications and also large funding through the National Health and Medical Research Council.”*
- During the 2021-22 year, RAH requested significant funding for a Da Vinci XI Robotic Assisted Surgical System. The Da Vinci XI System provides world class minimally invasive robotic assisted surgery in cancer and other fields. Although ultimately not purchased in the 2021-22 or 2022-23 financial years, funding for the Da Vinci XI System has again been committed to be provided during 2023-24.

The list of projects funded during the 2022-23 financial year is extensive. Detailed below are some of the projects where significant funds were advanced during the year.

Research and Research Equipment:

- (CRIPS) Aboriginal dialysis models of care – improving health outcomes in Aboriginal patients by improving adherence to dialysis treatment.
- (CRIPS) Advanced Recovery Room Care – an iterative model to improve outcomes and reduce cost in perioperative care.
- Research and development into machine learning in partnership with university and research institutes to develop cutting edge algorithms to improve prognosis, diagnosis, and treatment.

- Research into Immunogenicity and safety of COVID-19 vaccines in immunodeficiency patients and allogeneic hematopoietic stem cell transplant (HSCT) recipients – POTENCY Study.
- Research and study of Collection of Coronavirus COVID-19 outbreak samples in South Australia.
- Investigating novel biomarkers of Rheumatoid Arthritis pathogenesis and response to conventional disease modifying agents in Rheumatoid Arthritis.
- Scleroderma and other inflammatory diseases.
- Reduction Of Chronic Post-surgical Pain with Ketamine - ROCKET Trial.
- A new androgen receptor targeting strategy for prostate cancer.
- New azithromycin derivatives to address off-target effects for autophagy and the selection of antibiotic resistant bacteria in COPD.
- More or less? Bile acids and glycaemic control in type 2 diabetes.
- Utility of a Maturity Onset Diabetes of the Young (MODY) probability calculator and exome sequencing to diagnose monogenic diabetes in the Australian clinic setting.
- Clinical testing of new T-cell therapy for adult and paediatric patients with aggressive primary brain cancers.
- Recent onset rheumatoid arthritis program.
- SA Cancer Research Biobank – contribution towards ensuring maintenance of the Biobank which provides tumour tissue samples for medical research to improve patient outcomes.
- Elucidating coding region targets of micro RNAs.
- Does resection of metastatic lateral lymph nodes in patients with rectal cancer improve survival?
- Funding of research equipment including Zeiss Axioscan with brightfield and fluorescence scanning.
- Quantstudio 7 flex 384 well-fixed block PCR with additional capacity for protein thermostability measurement.
- Nova Flex2 Bioprofile Analyser.
- 500 watt Ultrasonic Processor.
- Refrigerated benchtop Centrifuge 5810/5810 R (15ml and 50ml tubes).

Clinical Equipment and other significant programs funded include:

- Patient-reported experience and outcomes program allowing capture of the patient's perception of their experience with health care services used to review and strengthen healthcare services and patient support both in and out of hospital.
- Building on the previous and continuing success of the PINI (Preventing Neurological Injury in Preterm Infants) program, PINI 2 aims to expand the

program into a broader perinatal program and provide further training to frontline staff and integration of family representatives within the program.

- Beyond Choosing Wisely at the WCHN – an expansion of the global clinical evaluation program to all divisions, including non-clinical areas, to build on the improvement in resource utilisation, reduction in patient appointment/wait time and clinical and treatment benefits achieved through the initial program.
- Development of overarching research communications at the RAH to benefit patient care and well-being.
- Gifts and amenities for long term/chronically ill/covid patients to improve their hospital stay.
- Volunteer support to the RAH/Hampstead and TQEH including volunteer reward and recognition events, service badges, volunteer uniforms, travel costs, salary support for the Volunteer's Coordinator and admin support.

In addition to the above, many other meaningful programs were supported such as:

- Professional and Skills Development Workshops (including conferences and seminars).
- Staff recognition events.
- Christmas Cheer for patients and staff spending Christmas in hospital.
- Support for patients suffering financial hardship.
- Various patient support programs in various departments including Mental Health, Renal, Rehabilitation, NICU and Oncology.
- Significant research projects are also funded by the Board as Trustee of the Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust (details can be found under “**Other Administered Entities**” on page 32).

Through the various initiatives related to the management of investments and application of funds to PHEs, the Board has helped facilitate a significant flow of funds year on year to its principal PHE stakeholders.

Consultation undertaken:

During the year the Board sought and obtained, where appropriate, specialist advice and input to aid it in its assessment of matters brought before it as is provided for under Section 15(d) of the HSCG Act.

Prescribed Research Body

SAHMRI is declared as a prescribed research body as defined under Section 3 of the HSCG Act. As a prescribed research body, SAHMRI pursuant to Section 4 of the HSCG Act cannot be declared a PHE.

The Board consulted with SAHMRI in relation to new matters involving expenditure to be applied for the purposes of clinical equipment or research during the 2022-23 financial year as is required under Section 15(d) of the HSCG Act.

No funds have been held for or on SAHMRI's behalf during or at the end of the financial year or in the period up to the completion of this report.

Other Administered Entities

Separate audited financial statements are included as part of the supplementary statements appended to this report.

The Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust (Norman Trust)

Valued at 30 June 2023 at \$7.63m, the Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust was established by the late Mr Norman with the income from the Trust to be used for the purpose of the prevention and cure of cancer and anything incidental or conducive to those purposes.

During the financial year, funding of \$0.47m was applied to the following multi-year research projects.

- BCR-ABL1 independent genomic factors that influence treatment decisions and outcome for patients with chronic myeloid leukaemia.
- Assessing novel therapeutics for the treatment of chemotherapy-resistant ovarian cancer.
- Can senolytic agents, which target senescent bone marrow mesenchymal stromal cells, inhibit the progression of multiple myeloma?
- Development of new combination immunotherapies for glioblastoma based on Chimeric Antigen Receptor (CAR)-T cell and Bispecific T cell Engager (BiTE) technologies.

As at 30 June 2023, research funding committed to and not yet due for these projects totalled \$0.3m.

The Dorothy E Brown Charitable Trust (Brown Trust)

This Trust was established by deed poll dated 17 December 2014 for the “*benefit of sufferers from kidney diseases or complaints*”. Under the deed poll “*trust monies are to only be expended on benefits that such patients would not normally receive or enjoy as patients of hospitals*”.

At 30 June 2023 the balance of the Trust was \$0.25M. Trust funds are invested with Funds SA in its Conservative Investment Product.

PF Beinke Charitable Trusts

The three PF Beinke Charitable Trusts were established under a Deed of Trustee Retirement, Appointment and Indemnity (**Deed**) in July 2020. The late Mr Beinke left the residue of his estate in equal parts to the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Flinders Medical Centre and Daw Park Repatriation Hospital for the purpose and education of chaplains at the three institutions. HSCGB as trustee of the three trusts collectively referred to as the Beinke Trusts include supplementary financial statements for the financial year just ended.

Since their commencement the Beinke Trusts have provided funding for attendance of Chaplains at relevant conferences and other professional development and training for Chaplains at the three institutions.

PF Beinke Charitable Trust – Royal Adelaide Hospital (The Chapel Fund)

The PF Beinke Charitable Trust – Royal Adelaide Hospital (The Chapel Fund) was established in July 2020 to manage the funds “... *for the benefit of The Chapel Fund for the express purpose of providing education and training and associated expenses for Chaplains in their role at this institution*”.

At 30 June 2023 the balance of the Trust was \$0.26m. Trust funds are invested with Funds SA in its Conservative Investment Product.

PF Beinke Charitable Trust – Flinders Medical Centre (Pastoral Care Account)

The PF Beinke Charitable Trust – Flinders Medical Centre (Pastoral Care Account) was established in July 2020 to manage the funds “... *for the benefit of The Pastoral Care Account and for the express purpose of providing education and training and associated expenses for Chaplains in their role at this institution*”.

At 30 June 2023 the balance of the Trust was \$0.26m. Trust funds are invested with Funds SA in its Conservative Investment Product.

PF Beinke Charitable Trust – Daw Park Repatriation Hospital (Pastoral Care Chapel Account)

The PF Beinke Charitable Trust – Daw Park Repatriation Hospital (Pastoral Care Chapel Account) was established in July 2020 to manage the funds “... *for the benefit of The Pastoral Care Chapel Account and for the express purpose of providing education and training and associated expenses for Chaplains in their role at this institution*”.

At 30 June 2023 the balance of the Trust was \$0.27m. Trust funds are invested with Funds SA in its Conservative Investment Product.

Other Matters

Transfer of Specified Property to a Health Advisory Council (HAC)

No application has been made by a HAC to transfer property to the HSCGB as is permitted under Section 26 of the HSCG Act.

Major Bequests

Thomas Martin Estate

TA 86, which is the land on the south-west corner of Pulteney Street and Rundle Mall in the central business district of Adelaide, was bequeathed to the RAH as part of the Thomas Martin Estate and this property is vested with the Board in perpetuity in accordance with the provisions of Section 25 of the HSCG Act.

On this site, the Citicentre building construction was completed in August 1988.

Together with Part Town Acre 85, which was purchased by the Board in 1981, the Board receives an 8% rent based on the “site” or unimproved valuation. Pursuant to the Head Lease this valuation is reviewed every five years with the most recent review completed in March 2022. The Board also receives an additional annual payment equivalent to 4% of the net profit of the property. This income is used to pay for many important programs at the RAH. The Martin Estate was valued at \$72.m as at 30 June 2023.

Summary of Major Bequests

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 30 June 2023

1 About the Health Service Charitable Gifts Board

The *Health Services Charitable Gifts Act 2011* was proclaimed on 30 June 2011 and commenced on 1 July 2011 (the HSCG Act).

The Board does not control any other entity and has no interests in unconsolidated structured entities. The financial statements and accompanying notes include all the controlled activities of the Board.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements prepared in compliance with:

- section 23 of the *Public Finance and Audit Act 1987*;
- Treasurer's Instructions and Accounting Policy Statements issued by the Treasurer under the *Public Finance and Audit Act 1987*;
- the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission Act 2012*; and
- relevant Australian Accounting Standards.

For the purposes of preparing the financial statements the Board is a not-for-profit entity. The financial statements have been prepared based on a 12 month period and presented in Australian currency. The historical cost convention is used unless a different measurement basis is specifically disclosed in the note associated with the item measured.

Income, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except:

- when the GST incurred on a purchase of goods or services is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO), in which case the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item applicable; and
- receivables and payables, which are stated with the amount of GST included.

Assets and liabilities that are to be sold, consumed or realised as part of the normal operating cycle have been classified as current assets or current liabilities. All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current.

All amounts in the financial statements and accompanying notes have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars (\$'000), unless otherwise specified.

The Health Services Charitable Gifts Board is exempt from income tax and has been issued with Deductible Gift Recipient status by the ATO. As a result, a donation received by the Board may be an allowable deduction to the donor.

Notwithstanding the income tax exempt status, the Board is entitled to a refund of excess imputation credits. The Board recognises the entitlement to this refund as revenue at the time of receipt of a franked distribution.

The Board is liable for GST, emergency services levy and local government rates.

2 Objectives of the Health Services Charitable Gifts Board

Pursuant to the HSCG Act, prescribed gifts made to or received by public health entities (as defined in the HSCG Act and Regulations) vest in the Board. A prescribed gift means property given to a public health entity (PHE). The Board holds these gifts, donations and bequests and ensures they are applied in accordance with donors' intentions, such as supporting volunteers, medical research, equipment for wards and patient comfort.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the HSCG Act.

2.1 Vesting of Gifts

On the commencement of the HSCG Act all property previously vested in the Commissioners of Charitable Funds formed part of the charitable assets of the Board.

The HSCG Act enables the Board to act as trustee or co-trustee of a trust where the Board is named or otherwise asked to act in those roles.

The Board has been appointed as trustee of the following trusts (refer to notes 2.3 to 2.5):-

- Ray & Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust (Norman Trust).
- Dorothy E Brown Charitable Trust (Brown Trust).
- P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Royal Adelaide Hospital (The Chapel Fund).
- P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Flinders Medical Centre (Pastoral Care Account).
- P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Daw Park Repatriation Hospital (Pastoral Care Chapel Account).

As the assets of the trusts have not vested in the Board, the operations of each trust are reported separately from those of the Board.

2.2 Investment of Funds

Under the HSCG Act the Board has all the powers of a natural person that are capable of being exercised by a body corporate. It is able to determine appropriate investment strategies to apply.

Pursuant to section 23 of the HSCG Act, the Board meets regularly with the public sector employee who has been nominated by the Minister for Health and Wellbeing.

The Board is registered as a Prescribed Public Authority and primarily invests in a range of managed investment unit trust products offered by Funds SA. Funds SA is a South Australian Government owned corporation investing and managing the monies of prescribed authorities. There has been significant volatility in markets during the period and whilst Funds SA has very clear policies in mitigating risk, the Board's investment returns for the year reflect these global trends.

2.3 Ray & Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust (Norman Trust)

The Board was appointed as sole trustee of the Norman Trust on 21 September 2011 by way of orders from the Supreme Court of South Australia.

The Board administers the revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities in accordance with the terms of the document establishing the Norman Trust. As these funds do not form part of the charitable asset they are not recognised in the Board's financial statements.

Note 13 includes a summary of the financial results of the Norman Trust for the year.

2.4 Dorothy E Brown Charitable Trust (Brown Trust)

The Board was appointed as trustee of the Brown Trust on 17 December 2014 pursuant to a Deed Poll following Supreme Court action required to clarify the terms of the will of the late Mrs Dorothy E Brown.

The Board administers the revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities in accordance with the terms of the document establishing the Brown Trust. As these funds do not form part of the charitable asset they are not recognised in the Board's financial statements.

Note 14 includes a summary of the financial results of the Brown Trust for the year.

2.5 P F Beinke Charitable Trusts (Beinke Trusts)

Pursuant to the Will of Mr Peter Francis Beinke the residual balance of his estate was to be held in three separate Charitable Trusts, one for each of the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Flinders Medical Centre and Daw Park Repatriation Hospital.

Each Trust was entitled to one third of the balance of his estate for the specific purpose of "providing education and training and associated expenses for Chaplains in their role at each institution".

In accordance with a Deed of Trustee Retirement Appointment & Indemnity dated 1 July 2020 the Board was appointed as trustee to each of these trusts which have been identified as:

- P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Royal Adelaide Hospital (The Chapel Fund)
- P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Flinders Medical Centre (Pastoral Care Account)
- P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Daw Park Repatriation Hospital (Pastoral Care Chapel Account)

The Board administers the revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities in accordance with the terms of the document establishing the Beinke Trusts. As these funds do not form part of the charitable asset they are not recognised in the Board's financial statements.

Notes 15 includes a summary of the financial results of each of the Beinke Trusts for the year.

2.6 Impact of COVID-19 pandemic on the HSCGB

The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the operations of the Board and these impacts are included under the relevant disclosure notes.

The key impact in 2022-23 relates to continued significant volatility in the valuation outcomes of managed investment unit trust products offered by Funds SA as a result of Australian and overseas financial markets (note 7.3).

Secured loan at cost

The Board provided a loan of \$15 million to South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI) in the 2014 year for a total period of 15 years. The funds were used to acquire, establish and commission a cyclotron facility in South Australia to produce isotopes for use by South Australian organisations.

Only interest was payable on the loan for the first 5 years. Principal and interest payments applied from the quarter ended December 2018.

The loan is secured against other funds held and invested by SAHMRI Investments Pty Ltd and guaranteed by SAHMRI. The interest rate is based on the Reserve Bank of Australia Cash Rate plus a margin of 0.75%.

Interest and principal payments have been made in accordance with the principal loan terms and the Board considers that the loan was not impaired as at 30 June 2023. Therefore, it is appropriate to show the principal payments due in the ensuing 12 months as a current asset with the remainder disclosed as a non-current asset.

The Board is a Prescribed Public Authority and holds significant financial assets in a range of managed investment unit trust products offered by Funds SA. The M3 Property Valuation was an independent valuation performed as part of the 5 yearly revaluation as required by the lease. This valuation was the third independent valuation and M3 were engaged to resolve a dispute between the lessor and lessee. This was an extensive process and the Board considers this to be the most accurate assessment of the fair value of the property and that this value has not materially altered from the time of the valuation to 30 June 2023.

The Waymouth Street property comprises 4 tenancies with the generally known street address of 234-240 Waymouth Street. The title reference and valuation refers to this property as 236-240 Waymouth Street Adelaide but this is the entire property. This was valued at 30 June 2023 by the Valuer General resulting in an increase in the carrying value for the year of \$675,000 (2022: increase \$404,000).

The lease over the Citi Centre property is for ground rent only and comprises base annual rental (paid monthly) of 8% of the value of the land. The value of the land is reviewed every 5 years in accordance with the lease. The most recent determination was undertaken in 2021 and completed in 2022. It is effective from August 2021.

The lease has been renewed for a period of 33 years to August 2052. An extensive upgrade of both the retail and office areas of the building constructed on the land being leased was undertaken in recent years. Pursuant to the lease the lessee is entitled to an abatement of the rent during the period of the upgrades. The period of abatement finished in July 2021.

This base rent is supplemented each year by the payment of 4% of the Lessee's net income. This at risk component has not been included in the above calculation.

11.3 COVID-19 Pandemic

12 Measurement and risk

12.1 Fair value

AASB 13 *Fair Value Measurement* defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants, in the principal or most advantageous market, at the measurement date.

Initial recognition:

Non-current tangible assets are initially recorded at cost or at the value of any liabilities assumed, plus any incidental cost involved with the acquisition.

Where assets are acquired at no value, or minimum value, they are recorded at fair value in the Statement of Financial Position.

Revaluation:

Equipment is subsequently measured at fair value after allowing for accumulated depreciation.

The revaluation process is reviewed by the Executive Officer and the Board each year.

Non-current tangible assets are valued at fair value and revaluation of non-current assets or group of assets is only performed when the fair value at the time of acquisition is greater than \$1.5 million and estimated useful life is greater than three years.

The Board has no equipment assets with a value greater than \$1.5 million at acquisition. No revaluations have been performed.

Investment properties have a value greater than \$1.5 million therefore have been revalued, refer to note 8.2.

Liquidity risk arises where the Board is unable to meet its financial obligations as they fall due.

Other than the specific items mentioned below the Board's exposure to liquidity risk is considered insignificant based on past experience and current assessment of risk.

Details of significant accounting policies and methods adopted including the criteria for recognition, the basis of measurement, and the basis on which income and expenses are recognised with respect to each class of financial asset and financial liability are disclosed in the respective note.

As previously outlined in these financial statements the Board now primarily invests through various products offered by Funds SA. Funds SA is a large institutional investment specialist servicing the South Australian Government and its statutory authorities. The Board no longer actively invests directly in tradeable securities but rather in unlisted units in investment funds managed by Funds SA. The Board's liquidity risk for these products is now the risk of a request to redeem units not being satisfied by Funds SA in the required timeframe.

The Board is satisfied that the resulting liquidity risk is also insignificant based on Funds SA liquidity risk management policies as follows;

- The allocation of cash in the strategic asset allocation of each investment option is set at a sufficient level to manage expected cash redemptions, and
- A large proportion of each investment option is invested in highly liquid investments as actively traded equities, unit trusts or securities with short term maturities.

Credit risk:

Credit risk arises when there is the possibility of the Board's counterparties defaulting on their contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Board. The Board measures credit risk on a fair value basis and monitors the risk on a regular basis.

12.2 Financial instruments (continued)

The Board has policies and procedures in place to manage credit risk and to ensure that transactions occur with customers with appropriate credit history. The Board does not hedge its financial assets.

Note 7.3 refers to the Board holding a first mortgage charge over advances made to the Port Pirie Regional Health Service Inc. as well as to the long term secured loan made to SAHMRI to establish a cyclotron facility.

At reporting date funds totalling \$124,780,000 were invested through Funds SA. The Board considers the credit risk for financial assets invested through Funds SA lies with Funds SA and the fund managers responsible for the management of the underlying investments. The Board monitors Funds SA's performance relative to their competitors and also against their own benchmarks monthly. The Board also monitors the makeup of the underlying assets of the investment managers their products are invested in and that Funds SA are investing in accordance with the agreed Annual Performance Plan.

The maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date is the carrying amount of the financial assets.

The Board does not consider that any of the financial assets are impaired.

Refer to note 7.2 and 7.3 for further information.

Market risk:

Market risk is the risk that investment returns generated by the different financial markets will be volatile and will deviate from long-term expectations over the short/medium term.

As previously outlined in these financial statements the Board now primarily invests through various investment products offered by Funds SA. The Board no longer actively invests directly in tradeable securities but rather in unlisted units in investment funds managed by Funds SA. The Board's market risk is now the risk of a change in value of underlying assets adversely affecting the value of the Board's investment in these units.

The Board is satisfied that the resulting market risk has been significantly reduced based on Funds SA market risk management policies as follows;

- Ensuring a diversity of exposures to different financial markets and sub-markets; and
- Ensuring asset allocations for different investment options are consistent with the time horizon of each.

Sensitivity Analysis:

A general fall in the fair value of long term investments in unlisted unit trusts of 5% and 10%, if equally spread over all assets in the portfolio, would lead to a reduction in value of \$6,213,000 (2022: \$5,573,000) and \$12,426,000 (2022: \$11,147,000) respectively.

The Board believes the underlying quality of the assets support the conclusion that the value of financial assets are not overstated.

Under the terms of the Deed Poll the HSCGB was appointed as trustee and an initial sum of \$286,621 was provided by SA Health to be administered by the HSCGB. These funds are invested through Funds SA in an account in the name of the Trust.

In accordance with the judgment the terms of the Trust were varied whereby -

- the trust monies (income and/or capital) may be applied for the benefit of any patient of a hospital incorporated under the *Health Care Act 2008* who is suffering from a kidney disease or complaint; and
- the trust monies (income and/or capital) shall be expensed on benefits that such patients would not normally receive or enjoy as patients of those hospitals.

15 P F Beinke Charitable Trusts

The amount of this residue was held by Australian Executor Trustees Limited (AET) since his death in March 2014. Pursuant to a Deed of Trustee Retirement, Appointment & Indemnity dated 1 July 2020 AET retired as trustee and the Health Services Charitable Gifts Board (HSCGB) was appointed in its place.

On finalisation of the Estate of Mr P F Beinke, AET transferred three amounts of \$249,998 each to the HSCGB in its capacity as Trustee of each of the Charitable Trusts. These funds were initially invested through HSCGB pooled assets and interest paid to the Charitable Trust. In due course all funds were transferred to, and are now invested through Funds SA in an account in the name of the Trust.

We have also fulfilled our other responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

Without further modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 2 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the Ray and Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust to meet the requirements of the Trustee's needs. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

1 Objectives of the Trust

The Ray & Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust ('Trust' or 'Fund') was created under the will of Mr Raymond Norman who passed away on 23 March 2006. All income derived by the Trust is to be "used for the purpose of the prevention and cure of cancer and anything incidental or conducive to those purposes".

Under the terms of the will the Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH) was appointed as trustee of the Fund and were required to administer the Fund for the designated purpose. Following legal advice that the RAH was not able to act as trustee application was made to the Supreme Court and the Health Services Charitable Gifts Board (HSCGB) assumed the role as sole Trustee from 21 September 2011.

2 Statement of Principal Accounting Policies

2.1 Format of the Accounts

The attached financial reports and related notes are special purpose financial statements that provide information on the value and operations of the trust being administered.

The Statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting and are in accordance with the historical cost convention, except for financial assets which are reported at Fair Value in accordance with the applicable valuation policy adopted.

2.2 Taxation and Imputation Credits

The Ray & Shirl Norman Cancer Research Trust is exempt from income tax and has been granted status as a Charitable Fund.

As a Charitable Fund the Trust is entitled to a refund of imputation credits. Entitlement to this refund is recognised as revenue at the time of receipt of the franked dividend or distribution.

Income, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except:

- when GST incurred on a purchase of goods or services is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO), in which case the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item applicable; and

1 Objectives of the Trust

In accordance with the Will of Mr Peter Francis Beinke dated 19 February 2014, one third of the residue of his estate was to be used to establish a Charitable Trust for the benefit of the Hospital Pastoral Care Department of the Royal Adelaide Hospital "...for the express purpose of providing education and training and associated expenses for Chaplains in their role at this institution".

The amount of this residue was held by Australian Executor Trustees Limited (AET) since his death in March 2014. Pursuant to a Deed of Trustee Retirement, Appointment & Indemnity dated 1 July 2020 AET retired as trustee and the Health Services Charitable Gifts Board (HSCGB) was appointed in its place.

On finalisation of the Estate of Mr P F Beinke, AET transferred amounts totalling \$249,998 to the HSCGB in its capacity as Trustee of the Charitable Trust. These funds were initially invested through HSCGB pooled assets and interest paid to the Charitable Trust. In due course all funds were transferred to, and are now invested through Funds SA in an account in the name of the Trust.

2 Summary of Principal Accounting Policies

2.1 Format of the Accounts

The attached financial reports and related notes are special purpose financial statements that provide information on the value and operations of the trust being administered.

The Statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting and are in accordance with the historical cost convention, except for financial assets which are reported at Fair Value in accordance with the applicable valuation policy adopted.

2.2 Taxation and Imputation Credits

The P F Beinke Charitable Trust - Royal Adelaide Hospital (the Chapel Fund) is exempt from income tax and has been granted status as a Charitable Fund.

As a Charitable Fund the Trust is entitled to a refund of imputation credits. Entitlement to this refund is recognised as revenue at the time of receipt of the franked dividend or distribution in relation to investments held by the Trust.

2.3 Basis of valuation - Assets

Other financial assets

The trustee is a Prescribed Public Authority which enables the Trust to invest through Funds SA. As these investments are managed and their performance evaluated in accordance with a documented investment strategy and the information reported to the trustee on a regular basis it is considered appropriate that they be designated as fair value through profit and loss.

Investments are recognised and derecognised on trade date and are initially measured at fair value, net of transaction costs.

Financial assets and liabilities held at fair value through the profit or loss are measured initially at fair value excluding any transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset or financial liability. Transaction costs on financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are expensed immediately. Subsequent to initial recognition, all instruments held at fair value through the profit or loss are measured at fair value with changes in their fair value recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. Fair value of financial instruments are classified, according to fair value hierarchy, at level 2 - fair values that are based on inputs that are directly or indirectly observable for the asset.

Fair value of unlisted unit trusts

Investments in unlisted unit trusts are recorded at the fair value as reported by the managers of such funds as at 30 June 2023.

2.4 Basis of valuation - General

Accrued Revenue and Accrued Expenses are carried at their nominal amounts.

On initial receipt of funds from AET in the previous financial year the amounts were invested in the pooled assets of the HSCGB. A proportional share of the income generated by these assets were paid to the Trust by HSCGB and recorded as interest. For the current year all amounts were only invested with Funds SA.

The Trust invests in the Funds SA Conservative B - Taxed Fund which is a unit trust structure. As at 1 July 2018 Funds SA's unit trusts made an irrevocable election to become Attribution Management Investment Trusts (AMIT) under Division 276 of the ITAA1997. Under the tax law, AMITs are not required to make distributions, however unit holders still have clearly defined rights and entitlement. AMITs use the principles of attribution of income rather than the previous 'present entitlement' under the old trust rules. As a result the Trust still has an 'attributable amount' to the taxable income of the units it holds within Funds SA's investment options, however no physical distribution is required.

In accordance with the Will of Mr Peter Francis Beinke dated 19 February 2014, one third of the residue of his estate was to be used to establish a Charitable Trust for the benefit of the Pastoral Care Department of the Flinders Medical Centre "...for the express purpose of providing education and training and associated expenses for Chaplains in their role at his institution".

The amount of this residue was held by Australian Executor Trustees Limited (AET) since his death in March 2014. Pursuant to a Deed of Trustee Retirement, Appointment & Indemnity dated 1 July 2020 AET retired as trustee and the Health Services Charitable Gifts Board (HSCGB) was appointed in its place.

On finalisation of the Estate of Mr P F Beinke, AET transferred amounts totalling \$249,998 to the HSCGB in its capacity as Trustee of the Charitable Trust. These funds were initially invested through HSCGB pooled assets and interest paid to the Charitable Trust. In due course all funds were transferred to, and are now invested through Funds SA in an account in the name of the Trust.

2.1 Format of the Accounts

The attached financial reports and related notes are special purpose financial statements that provide information on the value and operations of the trust being administered.

Fair value of financial instruments are classified, according to fair value hierarchy, at level 2 - fair values that are based on inputs that are directly or indirectly observable for the asset.

Investments in unlisted unit trusts are recorded at the fair value as reported by the managers of such funds as at 30 June 2023.
